I have helped students when they were writing, and when they got stuck I told them what I did when I was stuck. It is sometimes more comfortable for a student to get help from another student.

It makes me want to stay in the program so I can keep learning and keep helping others. I really enjoy everything I'm doing, and I think you will too if you get involved in your program.
